### A Stewardship Reflection

Imagine Together: A Sense of Wonder

Matthew 6:26-30

### Introduction

What do you see when you look at the world around you? Do you experience awe and gratitude or take things for granted? These are essential questions to ask ourselves because they reveal our attitude toward God and God's creation. They also affect our sense of stewardship, which is our responsibility to care for the earth and everything in it as God's gift.

In Matthew 6:26-30, Jesus teaches us a valuable lesson about stewardship, using examples from the natural world. He invites us to look at the birds of the air and the lilies of the field, and to learn from them how to trust God and appreciate God's care. He also challenges us to examine our worries and priorities, and to seek God's kingdom and righteousness first. Let us examine the passage with an open heart and a sense of wonder.

Have we paid attention to looking at the birds, the lilies of the field, and the grass of the field? Imagine the pure wonder of a three-year-old blowing dandelion wisps for the first time. Children are made of awe and they have so much to teach us. In *This Here Flesh*, Cole Arthur Riley points out the societal shift that diminishes the value of childlike awe. Riley encourages us to reclaim that sense of wonder, allowing ourselves to be captivated by beauty and granting goodness the space it deserves in our inner worlds.

### Rediscovering Wonder

A sense of wonder, a rich blend of surprise, curiosity, contemplation, and joy tends to wane as we age. In the pursuit of seriousness, often equated with wisdom, we overlook the simple and mundane, fixating on the profound and grave. Riley aptly describes the path to wonder as a backward-wound clock, embracing the foolish and excessive. True beauty lies not only in the majestic but also in appreciating the mundane, encountering the holy in the everyday spaces we may unconsciously neglect.

### **Embracing Profound Awe**

Jesus teaches us to look at the birds of the air and to learn from them how to trust God and God's provision. Wonder can be seen as a sense of profound awe and respect for the mysteries and beauty of creation. Observing and listening to the birds, returning to the land, and absorbing the wisdom of nature unveils the inherent value in all of creation. This sense of wonder leads us to appreciate not just the birds and the flowers but every aspect of God's creation, from the smallest insect to the largest mammal, and from the humble grass underfoot to the mighty forests. How often do we consider the lilies of the field, and admire their beauty and fragrance? How often do we smell the roses, and enjoy the gifts of God's creation?

### **Overcoming Worries**

Jesus, in verses 28-30, addresses worry about clothing, directing our attention to the lilies of the field. He does not advocate dismissing concerns or tragedies or masking our emotions. Instead, wonder requires a person not to forget themselves but to feel themselves so acutely that their connectedness to every created thing comes into focus. In sacred awe, we are a part of the story. Practicing wonder becomes a power tool against despair, like exercising the muscles of hope, fortifying our spirits, and enabling us to navigate through the darkest times with resilience and a steadfast belief in the inherent goodness and beauty present despite the prevailing challenges.

To evoke a sense of wonder, we need to approach nature not as an object to be exploited but as a subject to be engaged with. When we habitually overlook the profound beauty inherent in creation, relegate it to a mere resource for our consumption, and neglect the intricate marvels housed within our bodies, we unwittingly pave the path toward a dangerous transformation. Gradually, we begin to morph into creatures marred by a deep sense of detachment and disregard.

### The Liberating Power of Wonder

Living in a culture that glorifies busyness and rewards workaholism, we risk becoming creatures of hatred, detached from the liberating force of wonder. To reclaim wonder, we must resist the relentless pace imposed by societal expectations. Wonder frees us from numbness, and as Alice Walker wisely notes, it doesn't dismiss pain; it brings us out of it. In a society that devalues awe as frivolous, wonder becomes our remedy, guiding us on the path to liberation.

### Conclusion

In cultivating a sense of wonder, we find ourselves connected to God, creation, and the stories unfolding around us. Let us embark on a journey of rediscovery, embracing childlike awe, and allowing wonder to guide us toward a deeper appreciation of God's creation and our role as stewards of God's gifts.
